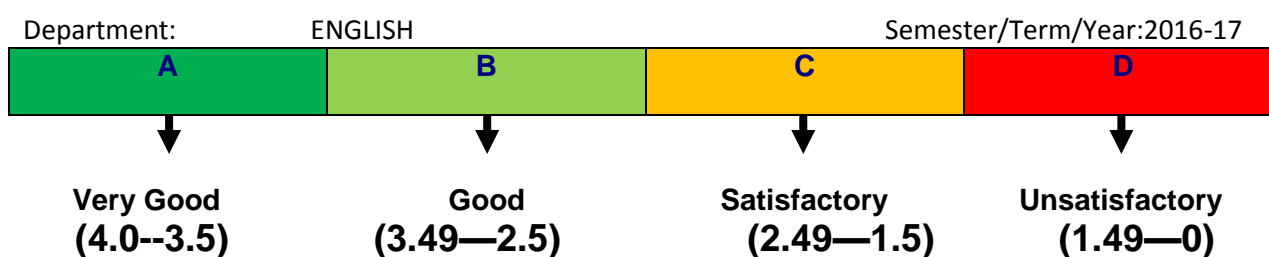

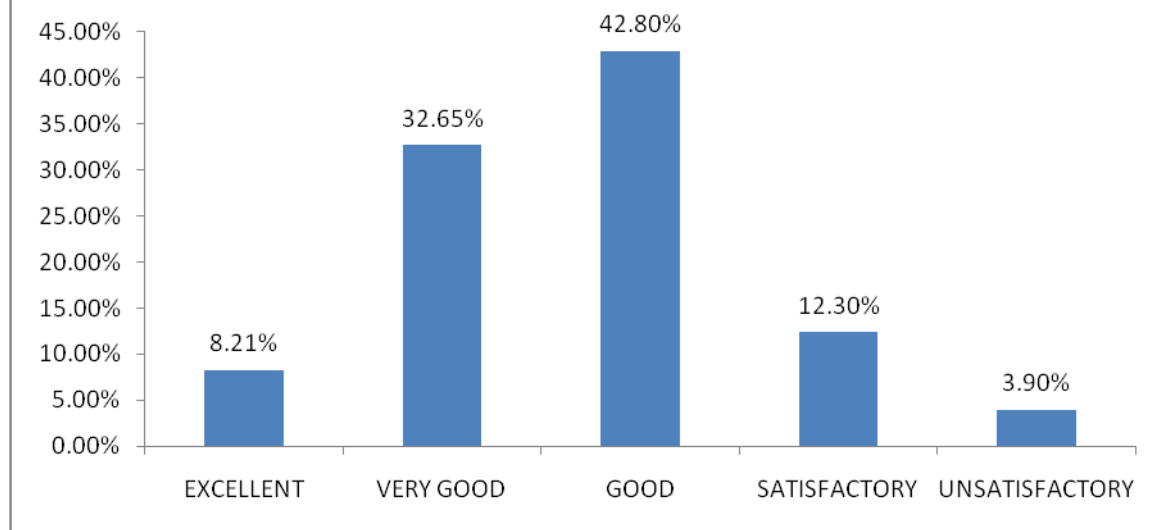

Overall rating of campus by Alumni (%) (2016-17)



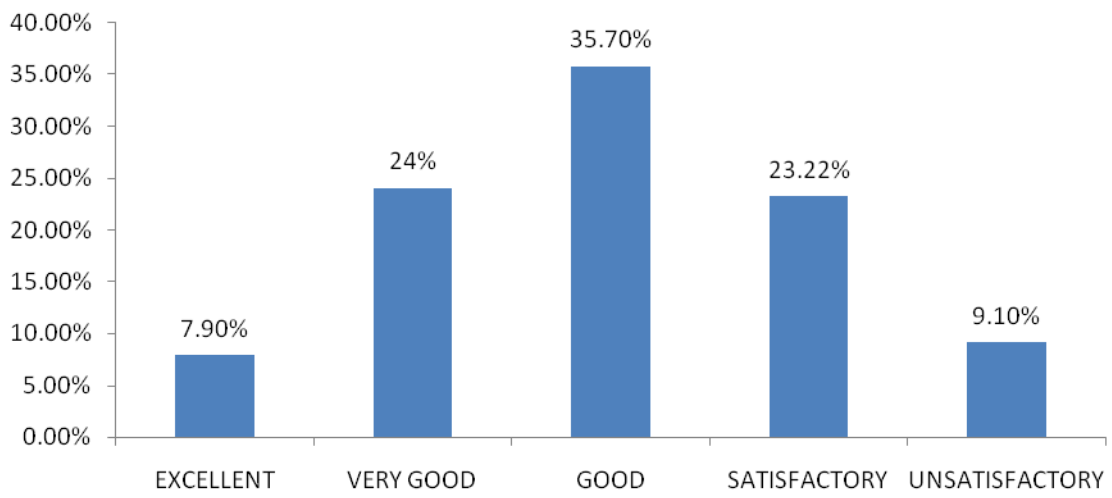

The main objective of this programme is to materialize one of the fundamental principles of National Service Scheme that a volunteer is expected to remain in constant touch with the community.

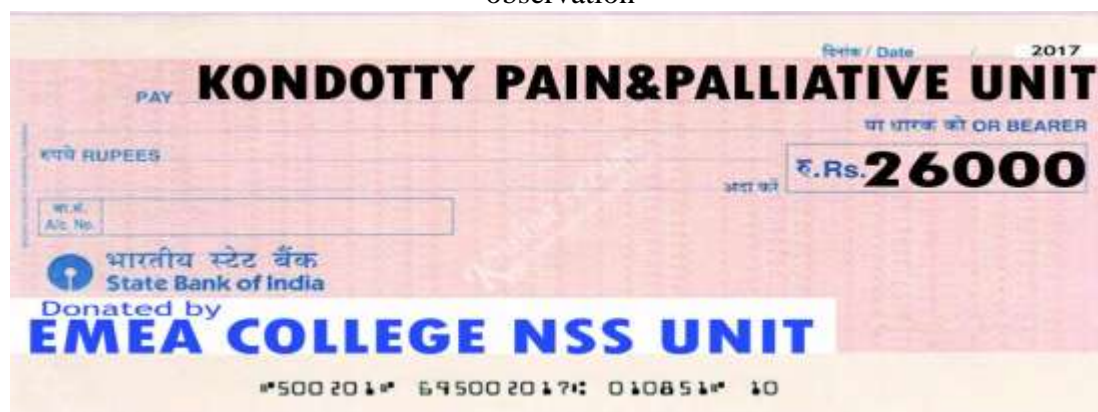
The context

The National Service Scheme units of this College have adopted Kumminiparamba, the village in which this college is situated. The village is socially, educationally and economically backward. Agriculture and related activities constitute the livelihood of the people. The Village adoption programme seems to be a success in fulfilling its objectives.

Evidence of Success

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The hesitation of some students to interact with the local people was the first problem encountered. The people also had some kind of inhibition to work together with student community. The regular field works done by the Programme officers and student leaders resolved this. The resources required was mobilized by the team NSS. Several philanthropists, NGOs, well-wishers, Alumni extended financial supports.
