

FEEDBACK SYSTEM

Importance of Feedback

The College aims to offer the best possible environment and learning experience to encourage students to perform to their full potential. Students play a critical part in the evaluation, development and enhancement of the quality of this learning experience. Feedback from students allows the College to evaluate how its service provision is viewed by its most important group of stakeholders, namely its students The Feedback system has put an increasing emphasis on the need for involvement of students in the quality assurance of higher education. Student involvement requires that students act as collaborators in, rather than merely passive receivers of, teaching and learning. Apart from student feedback there is provision for collecting feedback from Alumni, Parents, and Teachers.

How Feedback Obtained?

Students are invited, to complete a brief online feedback form, on an anonymous basis, towards the end of a semester. This process occurs on a twice-yearly basis: towards the end of the first semester, in October, and towards the end of the second Semester, in March. Whereas, the feedback of other stake holders is collected once a year by using separate questionnaires.

How Feedback is used?

After each semester, results of the feedback process are made available to the faculty members of the classes concerned, Heads of Departments, and areas for appropriate follow-up action are identified and communicated to the Departments.

1. Student Advisory Scheme

Teacher in Charge: Dr. Abdul Muneer V

It is an institutional mechanism for student mentoring. One advisor is there for each class to act as the mentor of that learner group. The roles and Responsibilities of class advisors are

- Help students achieve the goals which would lead to success in their program;
- Understand and assess students' fundamental needs in terms of their ages, life circumstances, and culture;
- Recognize when the role of "advisor" should shift to that of mentor, information or referral agent, advocate, and/or caring person;
- Be an effective "coach" in helping the student move through a problem-solving process;
- Accept and appreciate differences in learning styles and abilities; treat students with respect;
- Be open to receiving students' concerns, even those involving personal or ethical dilemmas--and respond in an open manner (and refer to appropriate resources);

2. Walk With a Scholar (WWS) scheme

Teacher in Charge. Mr.JafharOdakkal

Walk With a Scholar (WWS) scheme proposes to arrange specialized mentoring programs for students in Under Graduate Programs in Arts, Science and Commerce and to provide guidance for their future.

Guidelines

- (i) The College Council should identify a College level Coordinator for the WWS Scheme from the faculty of the college. Preference can be given to faculty who have worked as placement officers or coordinators of career guidance unit in the college
- (ii) The scheme should be discussed by the College Council and amongst the faculty members

(iii) The College Council should act as a Monitoring Committee for the implementation of the Programme and the Coordinator should function in consultation with the Principal and the College Council Student Selection:

(iv) Students (Scholars) of first year Degree Programme alone are to be included in the Scheme

(v) The number of students identified under WWS Scheme, should not exceed 30.

(vi) For the purpose of mentoring, two categories of mentors are to be identified. One will be 'Internal Mentor' and the second will be 'External Mentor'

(vii) The Internal mentor has to be a faculty from the Institution in which the student (Scholar) is studying.

3. Scholar Support Programme(SSP)

Teacher in Charge: Mr.Hussain V

SSP is another mentoring mechanism introduced by government of Kerala mainly for the benefit of slow learners

General Guidelines

1. The candidates selected under the Programme must be from the first semester of the Under Graduate Programme.

2. A college should select a maximum of 6 subjects and a maximum of 50 students under the Programme. The selection of the subjects should be done at the college level. One of the subjects to be identified must be English (Part I) for which 10 students may be selected.

3. A student should be included only for one subject other than English

4. The marks in the qualifying examination should be the criterion for selection of students.

- 5. Although it has been specified that those with marks below 60% only in the qualifying examination is to be included under the Programme, it may not be always possible to get students satisfying this criterion.
- 6. The subjects selected, the students identified and the list of Faculty members engaging the classes should be intimated to the Directorate of Collegiate Education at the earliest.

10. EVALUATION THROUGH INDIRECT GRADING SYSTEM

Indirect grading based on a 7-point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students. Mark system is followed instead of direct grading for each question. Evaluation (both external and internal) is carried out using mark system. The mark is later converted to corresponding grades based on a 7-point scale. For each course in the semester letter grade point and percentage of marks are introduced in a 7-point grading system. The percentage of obtained by the student shall be approximated to two decimal place.

The seven point grading system is as follows:-

Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (A+, A,B,C, D, E and F) to that course by the method of external and internal put together) is required in each course for a pass. Appearances for internal and external evaluation are compulsory and no grade shall be awarded if not present in internal/external evaluation.

A student who fails to secure a pass in a course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch. For the successful completion of a semester the candidate to move to the next semester irrespective of the grades obtained in each The evaluation of each Course contains two parts:-

- (1) External Evaluation:- 80% weightage (of the total marks)
- (2) Internal Evaluation 20% weightage (of the total marks)

11. EXTERNAL EVALUATION

External evaluation carries 80% of total marks. External examination for the semesters will be conducted by the University. Evaluation of answer scripts of even semester will be conducted in Centralised Valuation camps and that of odd semesters will be done by home evaluation method.

The external examination of practical courses shall be conducted by two examiners appointed by the University -one internal and one external. The project evaluation with viva-voce can be conducted either internal or external as decided by the Board of Studies concerned.

After the evaluation of external examination, only marks are entered in the answer scripts which will be converted to corresponding grades at the University through software.

12. INTERNAL EVALUATION

20% of the total marks of each course is awarded through internal evaluation. Detailed criteria for internal evaluation may be framed but he BOS concerned. Fraction of marks, if any, shall be rounded off to the nearest whole number. The internal marks are assessed on the basis of the following components:-

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

Shelter For Needy Programme by National Service Scheme: Shelter for Needy is an Institutional Social Responsibility Programme intended to provide housing facilities to poor and needy families in the adopted village. Usually, this project is carried out by Compulsory Social Service Scheme (CSS). Considering the seriousness of housing problem in the area College IQAC had urged other constituent unites to take the programme. Accordingly, the college units constructed one house in the year 2006. The year 2017-18 witnessed NSS units constructing the second house for a poor family in Kumminiparamba. The NSS team which includes teachers, students and local people who took upon the responsibility of implementing the project in an effective manner. NSS programme officers, Volunteers, Advisory Board members, parents and local people actively participated in different stages of programme planning, resource mobilisation, implementation etc.

Examination System: Till recently, the conduct of external examination was carried out directly under the supervision of principal. The College Council took a decision to decentralise the examination system and appoint Mr. Askarali A, a senior faculty as the superintend of external examinations. A separate room was set up with a strong room to keep answer books and question papers. Duty assignments, distribution and collection of examination materials was shifted from Principals cabin to examination room producing positive results of decentralisation and participative management.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

- 6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):
 - Curriculum Development: As per the rules and regulations of affiliating university, constituent colleges have a limited role in curricular as aspects. However college has developed a strategy to involve in the process. Firstly, it encourages the faculty members to engage in activities related to curriculumdevelopment in various universities and autonomous colleges. Secondly, as per the recommendations of IQAC various departments have adopted clubs and associations. Their activities enrich curriculum.
 - Teaching and Learning: The quality of teaching is enhanced mainly by faculty empowerment which is carried out in a multifaceted manner. Firstly, every newly recruited faculty member need to attend orientation programme as a mandatory condition for promotions. Secondly, they are assigned with specific roles in teams led by senior faculty members. There are also institutionally organised

- informal motivation talks by senior faculty members. The learning process is made more effective by using learner centred methods. Due importance is given to assignments, student seminars, study tours, industrial visits, use of e-learning resources etc.
- Examination and Evaluation: The college has taken a strategic decision to appoint one of the senior teachers a chief superintend of examinations exclusively for the conduct of external examinations, previous this duty was carried out by Principal himself. Further the examination room was shifted to a more spacious area. The newly constructed examination room with a capacity to accommodate 200 students and CCTV surveillance mainly reduced the problems of accommodating school of distance education(SDE) students send by the university.
- Research and Development: The research committee is made the main catalyst of quality improvement in research and development. IQAC is also instrumental in promoting research activities. In the year 2017-18, it has organised a separate programme to acknowledge the contributions of faculty and students with publication. Applause- 2018 was this a landmark in the history of research promotion.
- Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: The decision to include the proposal for the construction of library annex building under RUSA assistance was a major step towards quality improvement. In 2017-18 the college has finished the works of Audio Visual Theatre spending around Rs.70 lakh. The last year also witnessed strategic decisions to construct new Humanities block, improvement of road facilities, purchase of ICT equipment, Books and Journals (total estimate rs. 2.15 Crore) under RUSA project deserves special remarks.
- Human Resource Management: College has an effective strategy to utilise human resources for materialising the vision and mission of the institution. This includes management of faculty members, non-teaching staff, students, parents, alumni, management and the local people.

 Institution tries to identify the capacities of every individual/ group based on which the constituent units have been assigned specific roles. For example, IQAC recommended college council to depute Mr.FirozK.T, a prominent organiser who won state award for Best NSS programme officer to rejuvenate the activities of College Alumni. This decision produced expected results when the Mega Alumni Meet held in an exemplary manner. Similarly students as a team play a very important role in internal resource mobilisation. Shelter for Needy Programme(Adopted Village), Shihabthangal PTA Scholarship and Student Initiative in Palliative Care are some other examples describing the style of human resource management on the campus.
- Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The situations like industrial visits, project /dissertation works, study tours and invited lectures mainly strengthen the interaction between industry and institution. The college has identified departments of business administrations, commerce, biotechnology, microbiology and biochemistry as departments with potential to build up with industrial collaborations.
- Admission of Students: The quality of admission process is ensured by strict adherence to the rules and regulations of affiliating university. The entire admission except for management quota is centrally managed and allotments are done by the university. Nodal Officer is in charge of admissions and act as a link between the university and the college. College union usually set up a

help desk to make the process student friendly. Minimum mark restriction is in practice to ensure the quality of management quota admissions.

- 6.2.2 : Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:
 - Planning and Development: Total Campus Solution (TCS), the software largely support planning and development. The future plans of institution in general and constituents units in particular are prepared mainly based on the reports generated by TCS.
 - Administration: College promotes use of Email, WhatAap messages for communications. Automated Public Addressing system and Sign boards are also in use. LAN, Internet, Wi-Fi facilities and TCS Modules materialises e-governance in administration.
 - Finance and Accounts: TCS module is used for managing finance and accounts. Day books, ledgers, Reports/statements preparations are automated. SPARK software is used for preparing salary bills. An online payment is in practice for the disbursement of salary and other emoluments.
 - Student Admission and Support: College is a part of Centralised Admission Process (CAP) introduced by University of Calicut. The submission of application, preparation of rank list and allotment is fully automated
 - Examination: CCTV Surveillance makes the examination hall centrally monitored. The hall arrangements, allocation of seats, invigilation duty assignments etc have been made automated. Valuation duty of external examinations is communicated through email.
