#### **15.Multidisciplinary** / interdisciplinary

EMEA College follows the curriculum prescribed by the University of Calicut, ensuring compliance with the university's academic standards while enhancing this framework through internal initiatives that promote a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to learning. In the multidisciplinary approach, students explore subjects through the perspectives of multiple academic fields, broadening their understanding and skill set. The Choice-Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS), implemented by Calicut University, supports this by allowing students to choose open courses outside their core disciplines, fostering a diverse learning environment. The interdisciplinary approach at EMEA College integrates knowledge from different fields, enabling students to gain a more holistic understanding of complex topics. Various student clubs and communities, such as the Connect Community, the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC), and the Entrepreneurship Development (ED) cell, provide platforms for interdisciplinary learning. These groups organize workshops, seminars, and events that encourage students to apply insights and methods from diverse areas, creating a comprehensive, interconnected educational experience. In addition to these approaches, EMEA College has adopted Outcome-Based Education (OBE) within the university's curriculum framework. OBE ensures that specific learning outcomes are clearly defined, focusing on practical skills, industry relevance, and critical thinking. This equips students with the knowledge and competencies required to meet the challenges of the modern world, ensuring their preparedness for future academic, professional, and personal success.

#### 16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Credit Bank is a system that allows students to accumulate academic credits for various courses and educational experiences they undertake throughout their academic journey. These credits are transferable and can be accumulated over time to meet the requirements for degree programs or qualifications. The University of Calicut-affiliated institution adheres to the credit system outlined in the syllabus. The curriculum allows for electives for UG and PG degrees, which are provided to students as opportunities to earn credits. The use of MOOCs to earn credits was encouraged for the students. To get credits for internal grades, the PG students were told to take NPTEL ,SWAYAM courses. Although technically credit transfer is not possible without university approval, students are nonetheless advised to enrol in online courses in order to earn credits. The creation of unique pedagogical and curriculum approaches by faculty members are encouraged. Learning management systems like Google Classroom, Moodle Ed-Modo Flip learning and others have compiled the prepared teaching materials, videos, and other materials. The Academic Credit Bank at EMEA College, based on the Calicut University system, has proved to be a progressive and studentcentric initiative. By offering flexibility, recognition of prior learning, and seamless credit transfer, the system empowers students to take charge of their education and explore diverse learning opportunities. As the college continues to refine and develop the Academic Credit Bank, it will further strengthen its commitment to providing quality education and ensuring the success of its students.

#### **17.Skill development:**

The college has undertaken significant endeavors to enhance

vocational education in accordance with the National Skills Qualifications Framework. The college also provides soft skills training in its curriculum through common courses in accordance with university guidelines. Explore Future - Ready Courses in Computer Science" on 20-10-2023 illustrate the focus on cutting-edge technical education. Diary helps the faculty deliver the curriculum by framing the academic and classroom activities for a semester/year. A separate course outline for each course is made available to students at the beginning of the semester. The institution has the holistic development of students as its prime focus. As part of this, the dissemination of knowledge

hasbeen done giving importance to different, but important variables, and the focus has been given to all the three major domains of knowledge transmission: cognitive, psychomotor, and affective domains. Each year, once the admission process is over, an induction program is organized for newly enrolled students and parents. Immediately after the commencement of the classes, the departmentlevel bridge course is introduced to familiarize the subjects students are enrolled in and also to identify the remedial steps for pitfalls in the students if found. An introduction to various evaluation methods used by the college is given to students and parents at the time of the college-level induction program. Students are further made aware of more detailed and comprehensive rules and regulations regarding external and internal evaluations through the college calendar/diary as well as the college website. One new undergraduate coursehave been initiated. Since our college is affiliated with the University, the degree of academic flexibility is determined by the University itself. The College Academic Council has introduced certificate programs that are administered by the various departments. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is responsible for conducting the feedback collection and analysis, and it provides feedback to all relevant stakeholders. The integration of information and communication technology (ICT) into our teaching methods has seen a significantincrease. All classrooms are now equipped with the necessary technology, and teachers have been empowered to effectively utilize these technological resources. Implementation of a learning management system has proven beneficial to all students. During this period, a substantial number of faculty members have successfully obtained Ph.D. degrees. Among our 88 teachers, 19 now hold Ph.D. qualifications. We have also fostered collaborations in terms of publications, seminars, workshops, and internships to enrich the academic environment. One notable initiative from IQAC was the introduction of a more scientifically rigorous method for assessing students' learning levels. This responsibility was entrusted to the Student Advisory Scheme (SAS), which devised a centralized examination system to evaluate student learning levels. Subsequently, lists of advanced and slow learners were shared with relevant agencies, including the Principal Club Student Support Program, Remedial Coaching, and Mentoring Scheme, to provide tailored support and guidance.
